

Common English Bible Isaiah 6:8 *I*

I heard the Lord's voice saying, "Whom should I send, and who will go for us?"
I said, "I'm here; send me."

- I Samuel 2: 18
 Samuel was serving the Lord. He was a young boy, clothed in a linen priestly vest.
- I Samuel 3: 1-12, 15-17 (to 1st .), 18
 Now the boy Samuel was serving the Lord under Eli. The Lord's word was rare at that time, and visions weren't widely known.
 2 One day Eli, whose eyes had grown so weak he was unable to see, was lying down in his room. 3 God's lamp hadn't gone out yet, and Samuel was lying down in the Lord's temple, where God's chest[a] was.
 - 4 The Lord called to Samuel. "I'm here," he said.
 - 5 Samuel hurried to Eli and said, "I'm here. You called me?"
 - "I didn't call you," Eli replied. "Go lie down." So he did.
 - 6 Again the Lord called Samuel, so Samuel got up, went to Eli, and said, "I'm here. You called me?"
 - "I didn't call, my son," Eli replied. "Go and lie down."
 - (7 Now Samuel didn't yet know the Lord, and the Lord's word hadn't yet been revealed to him.)
 - 8 A third time the Lord called Samuel. He got up, went to Eli, and said, "I'm here. You called me?"

Then Eli realized that it was the Lord who was calling the boy.

9 So Eli said to Samuel, "Go and lie down. If he calls you, say,

'Speak, Lord. Your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down where he'd been.

10 Then the Lord came and stood there, calling just as before, "Samuel, Samuel!"

Samuel said, "Speak. Your servant is listening."

11 The Lord said to Samuel, "I am about to do something in Israel that will make the ears of all who hear it tingle!12 On that day, I will bring to pass against Eli everything I said about his household—every last bit of it!

Samuel lay there until morning, then opened the doors of the Lord's house. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli.16 But Eli called Samuel, saying: "Samuel, my son!"

"I'm here," Samuel said.

17 "What did he say to you?" Eli asked. "Don't hide anything from me.

So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him.

18"He is the Lord, " Eli said. "He will do as he pleases."

■ I Samuel 16: 1-13

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long are you going to grieve over Saul? I have rejected him as king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and get going. I'm sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem because I have found[a] my next king among his sons."

2 "How can I do that?" Samuel asked. "When Saul hears of it he'll kill me!"

"Take a heifer with you," the Lord replied, "and say, 'I have come to make a sacrifice to the Lord.' 3 Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will make clear to you what you should do. You will anoint for me the person I point out to you."

4 Samuel did what the Lord instructed. When he came to Bethlehem, the city elders came to meet him. They were shaking with fear. "Do you come in peace?" they asked.

5 "Yes," Samuel answered. "I've come to make a sacrifice to the Lord. Now make yourselves holy, then come with me to the sacrifice." Samuel made Jesse and his sons holy and invited them to the sacrifice as well.

6 When they arrived, Samuel looked at Eliab and thought, That must be the Lord's anointed right in front.

7 But the Lord said to Samuel, "Have no regard for his appearance or stature, because I haven't selected him. God[b] doesn't look at things like humans do. Humans see only what is visible to the eyes, but the Lord sees into the heart."

8 Next Jesse called for Abinadab, who presented himself to Samuel, but he said, "The Lord hasn't chosen this one either."

9 So Jesse presented Shammah, but Samuel said, "No, the Lord hasn't chosen this one." 10 Jesse presented seven of his sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, "The Lord hasn't picked any of these." 11 Then Samuel asked Jesse, "Is that all of your boys?" "There is still the youngest one," Jesse answered, "but he's out keeping the sheep."

"Send for him," Samuel told Jesse, "because we can't proceed until he gets here."[c]

12 So Jesse sent and brought him in. He was reddish brown, had beautiful eyes, and was good-looking. The Lord said, "That's the one. Go anoint him." 13 So Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him right there in front of his brothers. The Lord's spirit came over David from that point forward.

27 He said to Jacob, "What's your name?" and he said, "Jacob."

28 Then he said, "Your name won't be Jacob any longer, but Israel,[c] because you struggled with God and with men and won."

- 3 less, incorporeal impartation of divine Love to man, which, to use the word of the Psalmist, *restored* his Soul, — gave him the spiritual sense of being and rebuked his material
- 6 sense.
